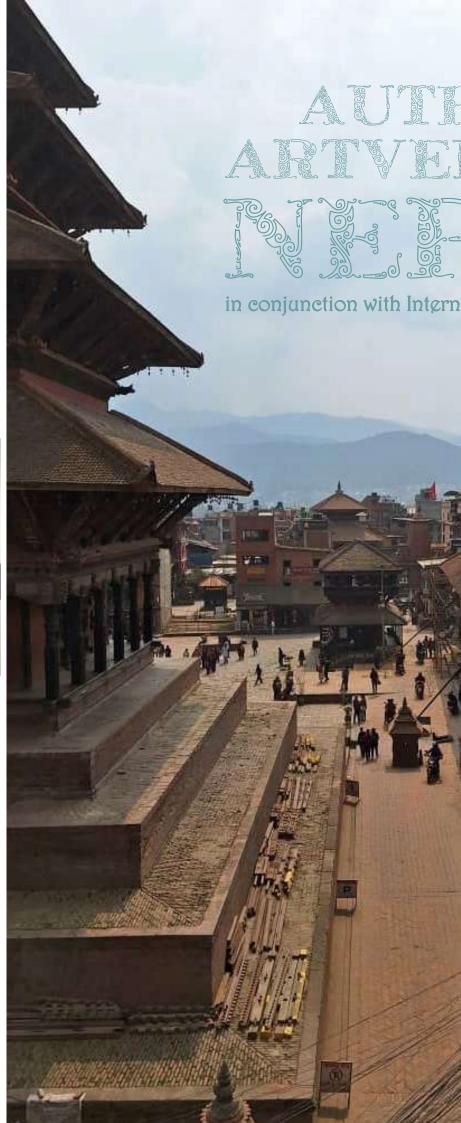

xcited and curious about Nepal, I immediately said yes to be part of an International Women's Day exhibition at the Classic Gallery, curated by its owner who is also an artist, the remarkable and renowned Sarita Dongol. As soon as we arrived, we were met with a warm welcome from Sarita with a Newari red sash, a bouquet of fresh gerbera and warm Tokla tea each. It was our first time in Nepal; all four of us Malaysian artists, myself, Sheila Kho, Shen Ying and Linda Yong. On the first night, we experienced Newari welcoming culture with a 29-year-old local liquor raksi, bara and dried fish. It was the start to an authentic experience of Nepali culture!



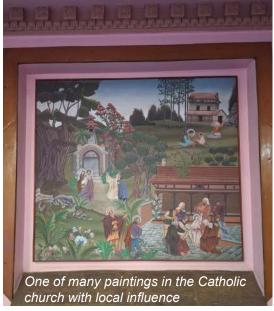






For the next few days, we feasted with both our eyes, heart and tummy. I caught a nasty cold on the way to Nepal but I did not let it get in the way! We were captivated by the ornate palaces, temples and ancient architecture boasting exquisite wood carvings while we meandered through narrow alleyways that felt like a labyrinth, including a Peacock window in Kathmandu and stacks of houses with trails of the 2015 earthquake in Lalitpur. We sketched to our hearts' contents at Bhaktapur, while being entertained by jewellery sellers. I felt like I was in a living museum. I particularly loved being at the Hotel Empire rooftop café enjoying masala tea and momo, their delightful dumplings. We were also soaking in art by visiting the Nepal Academy of Fine Arts, murals on the street, commercial galleries and the hip Kalashala art space run by an enterprising young artist, Sudikshya Dongol. Kirtirpur was quiet and quaint, resonating with tradition and community. We tasted rice wine, eating on the floor like we were one of the locals. I even had the chance to attend mass at a local Catholic church. The church was adorned with beautiful paintings depicting Nepali culture.

One of the highlights of the trip was an inclusive workshop held at the picturesque Taudaha Green Resort overlooking the scenic Taudaha lake, where we bonded with Nepali women artists sketching and painting plein air. I had the pleasure of introducing the endangered orangutan to a group of special needs women artists through a collage workshop, repurposing scrap papers. I also had the privilege of delivering a brief speech and reciting a poem dedicated to women during the event. Shen Ying mesmerized everyone with her beautiful Chinese ink art demonstration in swift and powerful strokes. We ended the day with dancing and eating beaten rice for the first time!

The main feature of our trip is the International Women's Day Exhibition. We were blessed with the charismatic presence of the Deputy Mayor of Kathmandu, Miss Sunita Dangol, journalists, art collectors and fellow artists. We witnessed curator Sarita Dongol launching the exhibition by lighting their traditional lamps and although we could not fully understand her speech in Nepali language, we could feel her passion, dedication, and enthusiasm. Sheila Kho gave a speech on behalf of us Malaysian artists and she shared our experiences, including funny ones, making everyone tickled. I was honoured once again to present a poem written specially for women that night, about us being weavers in the tapestry of life. The audience was fascinated by Linda, our avid sketcher, who performed live painting in the gallery with watercolour, splashing vibrant colours.

The artworks of the exhibiting Nepali artists were stunning and rich with heritage, with some younger ones exploring contemporary styles. The colours were mostly striking, some exploring bold concepts. Sarita Dongol's iconic chili was sold even before the event was launched. Congratulations! The four of us Malaysian artists also showcased different genres. Sheila's colourful Bornean tree of life expresses the fruitfulness of women, sprouting growth wherever we go. Shen Ying's Chinese ink paintings manifest blessings and prosperity, Linda's watercolour depicts the harmonious multicultural scenes of Malaysia and mine conveyed the coastal mangrove trees as symbolism of resilience and nurture, just like us women. It is also part of my ongoing work in supporting conservation for the natural environment.

The most heartfelt moment of this journey was facilitating the workshop for a big group of elderly women, joined by a few special needs ladies at an elderly care centre. Led by Sheila Kho with her fantastic supervising and improvisation, the majority of the older folks painted for the first time, dabbling with acrylic and brushes. Their fingers brought lavender in the fields to life on the canvases. The joy and laughter on their faces made our hearts fuller than the ocean. 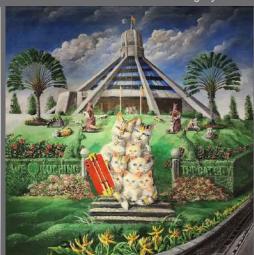

#### Sarawak Artists Society Marks Major Milestone with Regional Exhibition

## "Neighbours in Heart, Friendship in Art"

Sarawak Artists Society (SAS) has once again demonstrated its leadership in the region's visual arts landscape by successfully organising the landmark exhibition "Neighbours in Heart, Friendship in Art", held from 20 to 26 June 2025 at the Borneo Cultures Museum, Kuching.

Involving forty five artists from Sarawak and eighteen from Brunei, the weeklong exhibition featured ninety nine artworks spanning painting, ink, mixed media, digital art, and installation. The exhibition explored shared cultural themes such as heritage, identity, spirituality, and the natural environment of Borneo by providing a cross-cultural dialogue between the two nations.

The launch ceremony on 21 June 2025 at 10:00 a.m. was officiated by YB Dato Sri Abdul Karim Rahman Hamzah, Minister of Tourism, Creative Industry and Performing Arts Sarawak. The programme included a welcoming dance, official speeches, gift exchange between Brunei and Sarawak, opening gimmick, group photography, a tour of the gallery, and a lunch reception.

Over the course of seven days, the exhibition attracted 4,626 visitors, comprising residents, tourists, students, collectors, and government officials. It was supported by a comprehensive schedule of community-based activities such as cultural performances, workshops, and artist led sessions. All were designed to promote public engagement with the arts.

This exhibition marks a significant milestone for SAS, affirming its role as one of the most active and enduring arts organisations in Sarawak. Since its establishment in 1985, SAS has continuously driven artistic excellence and regional collaboration through regular exhibitions, cultural programmes, and international exchanges. The success of this event strengthens the Society's position as a catalyst for cultural diplomacy and heritage preservation.

#### A visitor to the event commented:

"This is more than an exhibition. It's a meaningful cultural connection. SAS has truly elevated Sarawak's presence in the regional art scene with this initiative."













The Society's ability to organise a regionallevel event of this scale demonstrates both its organisational maturity and the growing recognition of Sarawak as a vibrant hub for the arts. The collaboration with Creative Space Art Collective Brunei further underscored the exhibition's crossborder significance, opening the door for future joint endeavours between Sarawak and its neighbours.

Sarawak Artists Society expresses its profound gratitude to all who made the event a success. Special thanks are extended to the Ministry of Tourism, Creative Industry and Performing Arts Sarawak (MTCP) for their funding and policy support, the Borneo Cultures Museum (BCM) for hosting and technical assistance, STATOB for coordination, and to the Society's Bruneian counterpart, Creative Space Art Collective Brunei, for their artistic partnership and dedication.

With this exhibition, SAS not only celebrates artistic expression but also strengthens regional unity, fosters deeper understanding through art, and reaffirms its commitment to the promotion of Sarawakian cultural identity both locally and beyond.





# MY VISUAL EXPRESSION" ART EXHIBITION 2025

The "MY Visual Expression" Art Exhibition 2025 marks Sibu's first collaborative visual art exhibition between educators and active practicing artists. This event is jointly organized by the Confucius Institute at University of Technology Sarawak (UTS), Institut Pendidikan Guru Kampus Rajang, and the Sibu Contemporary Art Association.

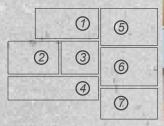
The exhibition takes place from 2 May to 4 May 2025 at the Foyer of Dewan Chancellor Tan Sri Tun Taib Mahmud, University of Technology Sarawak, Sibu.

The theme "MY Visual Expression" represents not only the artists' creative presentations but also reflects Malaysia — its identity, people, landscapes, and culture. The "MY" in the title draws a parallel to the national identity symbolized in Malaysia's internet domain ".my".

A total of 82 artists are participating, showcasing 192 pieces of artwork. The exhibition features a wide range of artistic styles, from realism to semi-abstract and full abstract expressionism. Over the three days, the event attracted an enthusiastic audience of approximately 1,200 visitors.

# Cooming: Sill al Aging Well of by SHEILA KHO

seen through the lens of numbers, but true grace lies in how we embrace life at every stage. In this article, we explore the power of creativity, the wisdom that comes with experience, and how art can enrich our later years. From the joy of finding new passions to the healing power of expression, aging well isn't about fighting time. It is about thriving through it.





#### A Glimpse in the Mirror

The reflection in the mirror reveals wrinkles, lines, and hands marked by time, gentle reminders of aging. Yet within those lines lies more than age, a story of experience, growth, and resilience. Unlike past generations, where women looked old by 50 in loose prints and elastic pants, today many in their 60s and 70s embrace fashion and vibrancy. The beauty industry thrives on this desire to stay youthful, generating over 600 billion dollars annually and projected to grow even further in the coming years.

Self-care has become serious а investment, with both women and men spending heavily on skincare, grooming, and fitness. The men's personal care market alone is expected to reach nearly 300 billion dollars by 2030. But beyond outward appearance lies a deeper question: how do we nurture our inner selves as we age? Living longer is not only about survival, it is about staying engaged, embracing wisdom, and choosing to live with meaning and vitality.

#### Malaysia's Aging Population

Like many countries, Malaysia is seeing a fast-growing senior population. People are marrying later, having fewer children, or choosing not to have any at all. In 2023, the Department of Statistics Malaysia reported that 7.4% of the population was aged 65 and above which translated is about 2.5 million people. By 2040, this number could grow to over 6 million, shifting Malaysia into an "aged society."

One thing that caught my attention while researching was the steady increase in life expectancy. If people are living longer, how are they spending their extra years?

Experts agree that staying active, eating well, and getting enough sleep are keys to aging well. But mental health is just as important. Many older adults face hearing and vision problems, memory loss, or the passing of loved ones. These changes can lead to loneliness or even depression.

I think of my late father, who lived to 95 with very few health problems. He used to walk every morning with his friends and enjoyed travelling with them. But one by one, they passed away, and he stopped going out. Instead, he spent his days tending to his fruit trees, reading the newspaper with his dog beside him, and looking forward to Wednesdays when his daughters and grandchildren would gather for dinner without fail. Often, one of us would take him for a car ride or drop in for a visit during the week.

Was he lonely or socially isolated? They may sound the same, but they are different. Loneliness is the painful feeling of being alone; social isolation means having very few people to connect with. I believe my father experienced more of the latter.

Thankfully, things are changing for today's seniors.



#### The Power of Staying Active

A good friend of mine is 83. She's energetic, alert, and drives herself to line dancing sessions. Her energy often puts mine to shame!

I also know a woman who recently celebrated her 100th birthday. Despite some hearing difficulties, her mind remains remarkably sharp, and she continues to join her close friends for weekly mahjong sessions, where her competitive spirit shines through.

My physician, who is in his 70s, recently shared an observation from his class reunion. He saw two distinct groups. Those who stayed active and those who did not. The active ones looked healthier, moved with ease, and had stronger voices. The others seemed to be simply "dragging" through life.

"That reunion was eye-opening," he said. "It made me realise how much movement and engagement influence vitality."

Research supports this. Older adults who are socially isolated are at higher risk of heart disease, depression, and memory problems. Those who remain socially engaged tend to live longer, feel happier, and keep their minds sharp.

#### Simple Ways to Stay Connected

Being around others lifts our mood and improves well-being. Even small gestures like a phone call, a short visit can make a big difference. Setting aside time each day to connect helps maintain relationships.

You can also meet new people by taking a class, picking up a new hobby, or joining a group. These activities not only keep the mind sharp but bring joy and a sense of purpose.

There are plenty of senior groups in the community that warmly welcome newcomers. From walking clubs and dance classes to prayer circles and faith-based support groups, there's something for everyone. Many of these groups organise activities tailored to members' interests. The introduction of pink buses in Kuching which offer free rides for seniors has turned even simple trips into adventures. Some senior groups have taken day trips to Serian and Bau, transforming a bus ride into a fun-filled outing brimming with laughter, sightseeing, and stories. Sometimes, all it takes is a small step to reach out, and you will likely find a group eager to welcome you.







#### **Art Therapy for Seniors**

I have been running art workshops with seniors for some time now. What I have learned is that they are always eager to learn something new. They take pride in their creations and enjoy the sense of community that comes with shared creativity. It reminds them that they are still capable and deeply valued.

Back in March this year, I had the chance to visit Kathmandu, Nepal, where I conducted a workshop for more than 20 senior Nepalese women with the help of two travel companions. Most had never held a paintbrush before. Though we did not speak the same language, we connected through hand gestures, smiles, and shared joy. The look on their faces as they completed their first paintings and proudly posed with them was unforgettable.

As someone who paints and teaches, I have seen firsthand how helpful art can be, not just for seniors, but also for children, including those with special needs. Art builds confidence, self-esteem, and connection. Whether it is a child lighting up at their drawing or a senior proudly displaying a painting, the effect is the same. Art helps us express ourselves, relax, and feel good, no matter our age or background.



#### How Art Therapy Helps Seniors

Who says fun and therapy cannot go hand in hand? Art therapy gives seniors a colourful way to stay sharp and happy. Picking up a paintbrush is more than play; it is a workout for the brain and the heart. Each stroke boosts confidence, awakens memories, and strengthens hand coordination. And when words fall short, colours speak, offering a gentle outlet for feelings. Group art sessions often turn into laughter-filled gatherings where loneliness takes a back seat.

Some may say, "But I play mahjong. It helps my brain too!" And they are right. Art and mahjong, along with many other activities, are powerful brain boosters for healthy aging. With art, memory, imagination, emotions, and decision-making all come alive. Studies show that seniors who stay creative are less likely to develop early dementia. Mahjong, on the other hand, is like a mental gym session with friends. It sharpens memory, boosts attention, and keeps social chatter flowing. The difference is that mahjong mainly trains logic and memory, while art stretches a wider canvas by tapping into creativity, problem-solving, and emotional expression. With dementia cases expected to triple worldwide by 2050, perhaps the smartest move is to enjoy both. Why not pair the brush with the tiles for a healthier and happier brain?

#### **Senior Care**

Too often, the interests and mental well-being of seniors are overlooked. Not just by society, but also in national development plans. While much focus is placed on younger generations, we must remember that older adults have shaped, and continue to shape, our communities in meaningful ways.

As Malaysia becomes an aging nation, future policies must include thoughtful provisions for seniors. This means creating opportunities for active aging, supporting mental health, and valuing the wisdom and contributions of our elders as a vital part of nation-building.

I recently attended a health talk, and one line from the speaker stayed with me:

"When we take care of our own health, we are not just helping ourselves. We are also easing the burden on hospitals and reducing healthcare costs for the government."

It was a simple yet powerful reminder that personal responsibility plays a big role in public well-being.

#### A Look Across the Border: Singapore's Aging Population

Like Malaysia, Singapore is experiencing a rapid rise in its elderly population. In 2023, seniors aged 65 and above made up 17.3% of its residents (about 718,000 people), a figure projected to reach 1 in 4 by 2030 and nearly 28% by 2050. To address this, Singapore has set up 214 Active Ageing Centres (AACs), with plans for 220 by 2025, ensuring most seniors live within walking distance. These centres serve as community hubs, offering activities, skills workshops, health talks, and volunteering opportunities that foster purpose and belonging.

Malaysia can draw inspiration from this model. While infrastructure won't be built overnight, progress is underway, especially with encouraging efforts from the private sector. In a recent local newspaper article, it was reported that Sarawak's population has declined significantly over the past seven years, from 2.8 million to 2.47 million. This sharp drop is an alarming signal that calls for more proactive measures from the state government. Sarawak, however, is not alone in facing this demographic challenge. Countries such as Japan, South Korea, and even China are grappling with similar issues driven by falling birth rates and rapidly aging populations. As the proportion of elderly citizens rises, it becomes critical to ensure that appropriate facilities and support systems are in place. Beyond basic care, centres should provide enriching activities such as art, music, and creative engagement, initiatives that nurture purpose, dignity, and opportunities for lifelong growth. The time to build this future is now. After all, aging doesn't wait. We will all be seniors one day.



#### Final Thoughts

While we await the rollout of more robust support systems for our seniors, there's no need to delay action. We can begin right now with what is already within reach. Art therapy offers a simple yet powerful way to enrich the lives of older adults. Beyond its therapeutic value, it brings joy, purpose, and connection. These elements are as vital as medicine. By encouraging creative participation, we nurture not just individual well-being, but the strength and compassion of our communities.

As we grow older, we don't have to fade. We can continue to bloom.





# SIBU as the Cradle of Creativity: Shaping Sarawak's

n 3 September 2025, the Economic Planning Sarawak convened an important workshop at the University of Technology Sarawak (UTS) Sibu to chart the future of Sarawak's creative industry. The event brought together policymakers, educators, and industry players to contribute insights into the state's Creative Industry Development Blueprint, a plan designed to provide policy direction, development strategies, and actionable steps to transform the creative sector into one that sustainable, competitive, and resilient.

Representing Sarawak Artists Society, President Sebastian Jong attended alongside members Johnny Tang, Amy Kho, and Ricky Hii. The team actively participated in discussions and voiced their vision for Sibu's role in the blueprint.

The Society proposed that Sibu be positioned as the "Cradle of Creativity" in Sarawak. With UTS as a center of higher learning and innovation, Sibu has the capacity to nurture young talent through structured training and education. More than just skills development, the emphasis was placed on shaping mindsets, as mindset ultimately determines direction, and direction determines success or failure.

The workshop underscored the ambition collective to elevate Sarawak's creative industry from a supporting role into a driving force for economic and cultural growth. By aligning policies with education and industry needs, and by recognizing regional strengths such as Sibu's academic foundation, Sarawak is taking bold steps toward fostering a creative ecosystem that will benefit generations to come.

# Ball Outdoor Sketching Activity at Mampung Tongga

On 1 May 2025, Sarawak Artists Society (SAS) organised an outdoor sketching session at *Kampung Tongga*, a serene and inspiring spot fondly known as "House by the Stream". A casual sharing session with Mr. Chua offered insights into his artistic journey, his passion for Chinese painting, and the creative vision behind the house, garden, and streamside retreat. The day concluded with a communal lunch, where conversations flowed freely and connections among members grew stronger.

This activity reflected SAS's commitment to nurturing a vibrant art community by providing members with opportunities to learn from one another, explore diverse techniques, and strengthen their artistic relationships, all while enjoying the beauty of Kampung Tongga's natural surroundings, marvellous landscaping, and peaceful stream.





ore than 400 artists from across the world came together under one roof for the **Kita Orang Art Exhibition 2025: Blue & White 400**, launched at The Linc Kuala Lumpur, a sweeping tribute to the **400th anniversary of the Wanli Shipwreck**. Among them were thirteen artists from Sarawak Artists Society (SAS).

The SAS participating artists comprised David Chew, Ng Paik San, Angelina Bong, Sebastian Jong, Sheila Kho, Chen Li Li, Lilly Metom, Aloysius Ho, Gerald Goh, Jane Ling, Clement Jonas, Georges Schneider and Leonard Darimi. Their works, created entirely in the exhibition's signature palette of blue and white, reflected both personal artistic journeys and Sarawak's layered cultural identity. Collectively, their voices extended the story of the shipwreck into contemporary explorations of memory, heritage, and belonging.

Behind the scenes, **Artavern Art Space** in Kuching played a pivotal role in ensuring Sarawak's presence at the launch. Acting as the collection and packing hub, Artavern coordinated the careful handling of SAS members' works bound for Kuala Lumpur, ensuring that Sarawak's contributions arrived safely to join the chorus of artists from China, Japan, Italy, Spain, the Philippines, Indonesia, Nepal, Thailand, and beyond.

The Kita Orang platform, created in 2023, is built on inclusivity and accessibility. Its very name, Kita Orang ("We, the People") signals an open invitation for both emerging and established artists to take part. This spirit was felt keenly at the KL launch, where visitors not only viewed the 400 works but also engaged in artist-led workshops, storytelling sessions, and demonstrations that celebrated art as a living, participatory language.

While Kuala Lumpur marked the beginning, the story does not end there. After a stop at The Whiteaways Arcade in Penang (November 2025), the exhibition will make its way to Kuching in early 2026, where Artavern Art Space will host the Sarawak edition. For local audiences, this promises to be more than an exhibition. It will be a homecoming. To see Sarawak artists alongside their international peers on their own turf will be a moment of pride and connection, situating Kuching firmly within the global cultural map.

李福嘉,1937年生於砂拉越古晉。1956年參加古晉美術會,1989年加入砂拉越藝術家協會。

2022年,李福嘉老師完成了他一生中最大幅的蠟染作品。

這段創作緣起於1972年。當時李老師原本為銅板浮雕計畫繪製了一幅草圖,但因製作材料短缺,作品被迫擱置。隨著歲月流逝,這份稿圖也被遺忘了。

直到2022年,我在整理李福嘉老師的作品時,意外尋獲這幅珍貴的草圖。經過數日討論,李老師決定將這幅未竟之作轉化為蠟染形式,並以此完成他藝術生涯中規模最大的一次挑戰。

在砂拉越,想当一名全職藝術工作者,是极具挑战及艰辛的路程。這裡资源丰厚,多元文化融合,卻少有空間讓「藝術」生根。大部分概念或生存法则任停留在努力与传统文化传播的层面,艺术被寄养滋生在旅游业行销链条里,或必须与资本,利益掛鉤才容易被「看见」。

許多热爱艺术的人只能等到退休後,才有 大把时间全心投入創作;而年輕一代,大 多仍在为着面包奔波,在极为有限的时间 缝隙里暗闻玫瑰香。

二十年前的父母說:「學藝術賺不到錢。」 唯有找最接近艺术的设计行业沾边,年輕 懷著夢想,以為熱情能改變一切。二十年 後,社會科技迅速发展,但讽刺的是這句 話依旧不變。甚至在政客口中,仍能聽見 「藝術家只有死後才有價值」,「要把孩子 送去学艺术,最好想清楚」。一开始听到 相当诧异,它揭示了当权者對藝術的不理 解,以及藝術在整個社會結構中被忽視的 價值。 这里的藝術環境,似乎只停留在形式與表面。官方的支持往往像節慶煙火,大型、热闹、人潮、高科技;却缺乏深度與延續。審美教育沒有被真正看重,大部分人民對藝術的認識依舊片面:它被視為裝飾、被當成消遣,卻少有人把它當成思考與文化的語言。創作因此變得單薄,缺乏對議題的研究與反省,作品難以承載時代的重量。

在這樣的土壤裡,藝術家成了孤島。市場無法 支撐,藏家稀少,藝術生態斷裂。 重复看見 的,是零星的努力、偶爾的花火,但缺乏讓這 些火光持續燃燒的系統與環境。世界已經走遠 一我們落後的,不只是技術,而是整個對藝 術的思維與價值觀。

我們最需要的是真正的覺醒:讓藝術不再被邊緣化,不再只是少數人的夢,而是這片土地共有的文化力量。唯有如此,藝術才能在砂拉越這片多雨的土地,重新發芽,有底气的向世界訴說屬於我們自己的故事。

# The Continuum: 3 GENERASI

The exhibition *The Continuum: 3 Generasi*, held at Hoan Gallery, La Promenade Mall, Samarahan Expressway, Kuching, from 25 July to 24 August 2025, marked a significant moment for Sarawak's art scene. Officially officiated by Datuk Snowdan Lawan, Deputy Minister of Tourism, Creative Industry and Performing Arts Sarawak, the exhibition celebrated the artistic legacies of three generations while setting an inspiring model for the future of curatorial practice in the state.

At its centre, the exhibition honoured the late Raphael Scott AhBeng, a pioneer of abstract expression in Sarawak whose vibrant landscapes continue to shape the language of Malaysian modern art. His influence resonates through Sylvester Wielding Jussem, whose works blend Bidayuh traditions with contemporary semi-abstract styles, and Dr. Mohamad Faizuan Mat, who pushes abstraction into new territories by capturing the energies of nature and experimenting with textures and materiality. Together, these three artists embody the "continuum" of Sarawakian art: past, present, and future which are woven together through shared knowledge, skills, and passion.

What distinguished this exhibition was not only the artworks themselves but also the curatorial vision behind them. Rather than approaching curation as promotion or salesmanship, the curator shaped a concept that highlighted the intergenerational transmission of artistic knowledge and values. The exhibition reminds us that the role of the curator is not to promise artists that their works will sell, but to create an intellectual, cultural, and creative space where legacies can be experienced, reflected upon, and celebrated.

This curatorial approach challenges the common perception of exhibitions as marketplaces

where works are merely "gantung" on the wall in the hope that visitors will buy them. *The Continuum: 3 Generasi* demonstrates that an art exhibition should never be reduced to the level of a *pasar malam* or retail shop. The true value of art does not lie in commercial transaction but in its ability to inspire, to teach, and to carry forward knowledge across time. Sarawak needs artists who are not merely *tukang jual* (sellers of paintings), but intelligent practitioners (thinkers and creators) who see their practice as a lifelong contribution to culture and society.

To strengthen this message, the exhibition was supported by a series of programmes that engaged audiences beyond the gallery walls. Sylvester Wielding Jussem delivered an insightful art talk on his late mentor AhBeng, offering personal reflections on his philosophy and influence. Razif Rathiled the *From Waste to Art workshop*, introducing participants to sustainable practices in artmaking. Live demonstrations by Dr. Mohamad Faizuan Mat and Sylvester Wielding Jussem gave audiences a rare chance to witness techniques and processes firsthand. These activities enriched the exhibition by transforming it into a platform of exchange, dialogue, and education.



The programme culminated in the launch of the book *Ko-kreasi Seni: Perihal* on 23 August 2025, coinciding with the closing ceremony. The launch underscored the exhibition's intellectual dimension, linking practice to theory, and ensuring that ideas of co-creation, knowledge-sharing, and cultural continuity remain central to Sarawak's art discourse.

In all, *The Continuum: 3 Generasi* sets a precedent for future exhibitions in Sarawak. It demonstrates that curatorial practice can and must rise above commercialism, situating art as a living continuum where wisdom, creativity, and spirit are passed from one generation to the next. It is a call for Sarawak to nurture intelligent artists and curators who understand that the strength of art lies not in glamour or price tags **but in legacy, dialogue, and the shaping of cultural consciousness**.

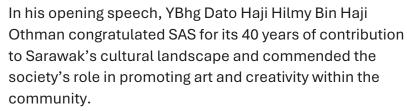

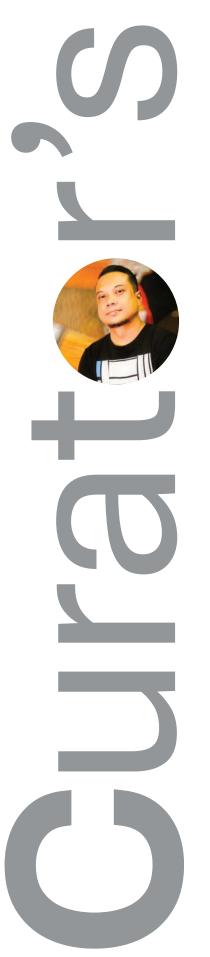

he year 2025 marks a remarkable milestone for Sarawak Artists Society (SAS) with four decades of continuous commitment to nurturing and promoting visual arts in Sarawak. Founded in 1985, SAS emerged from the collective passion of local artists who sought to create a platform for artistic exchange and exhibition within the state. What began as a modest community of painters and art enthusiasts has grown into a dynamic institution that reflects the evolution of Sarawak's artistic identity and its place within Malaysia's broader cultural landscape. Throughout its history, SAS has served as a vital meeting point for artists of diverse backgrounds and generations. The society's early exhibitions were grounded in traditional and modern painting practices, often highlighting local sceneries, daily life, and cultural motifs that define Sarawak's visual narrative. These early efforts built the foundation of an art movement rooted in local identity and community spirit, establishing SAS as a key force in the preservation and development of Sarawak's art heritage.

Over the years, however, the artistic landscape has expanded. SAS has progressively opened its arms to embrace other disciplines beyond painting, welcoming installation art, sculpture, photography, mixed media, and digital or new media practices.

This inclusivity signals the society's responsiveness to contemporary artistic trends and its willingness to evolve alongside the creative expressions of younger generations. By fostering a multidisciplinary dialogue, SAS continues to redefine what it means to be an artist in Sarawak today, acknowledging that creativity transcends medium and tradition. The exhibition Heritage Reloaded reflects this transformative spirit. Commemorating the 40th anniversary of SAS, the exhibition brings together 44 artworks that reimagine the meaning of heritage in contemporary times. While painting remains a strong and visible tradition, the inclusion of diverse art forms enriches the visual and conceptual experience, allowing audiences to encounter heritage through different perspectives, from tactile memories and cultural motifs to technological interpretations and environmental reflections.

**Curatorial Notes by Mohamad Faizuan Mat** 

What sets Heritage Reloaded apart from previous SAS exhibitions is the introduction of a curatorial framework. In earlier decades, exhibitions were often organized collectively by members, driven by enthusiasm and the shared joy of exhibiting art. These efforts-built community and camaraderie but often lacked a structured conceptual direction. In 2025, SAS takes a significant step forward by appointing a curator to guide the exhibition's vision and coherence. The curator's role here extends far beyond selecting and arranging artworks.

A curator is not an art promoter tasked with selling works, but rather a cultural interpreter, one who constructs meaning, connects ideas, and provides intellectual depth to the exhibition. Through curatorial planning, Heritage Reloaded gains a deliberate flow and narrative structure that engages audiences in a journey of discovery. The exhibition space becomes not just a site of display, but a space of dialogue, between past and present, between tradition and experiment, between heritage and innovation.

Complementing the exhibition are a series of art workshops, talks, and sharing sessions designed to enrich public understanding and participation. programs embody SAS's enduring These mission to make art accessible and meaningful to the wider community, emphasizing that art is not confined to galleries but lives through conversation, education, and collaboration. As SAS celebrates its 40th year, Heritage Reloaded stands as both a reflection and a renewal. It acknowledges the society's historical journey while projecting its vision for the future, one that is inclusive, interdisciplinary, and intellectually engaged. Heritage, in this context, is not a relic of the past but a living continuum, reloaded through the creativity and consciousness of each new generation of artists. This exhibition, therefore, transform, and inspire.

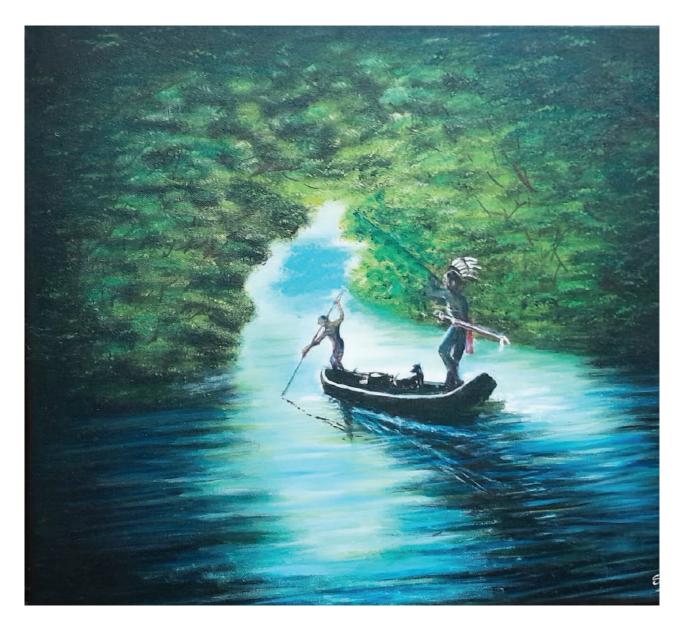

The sewing signifies our beings sewn into the fabric of a society that connects all of us.



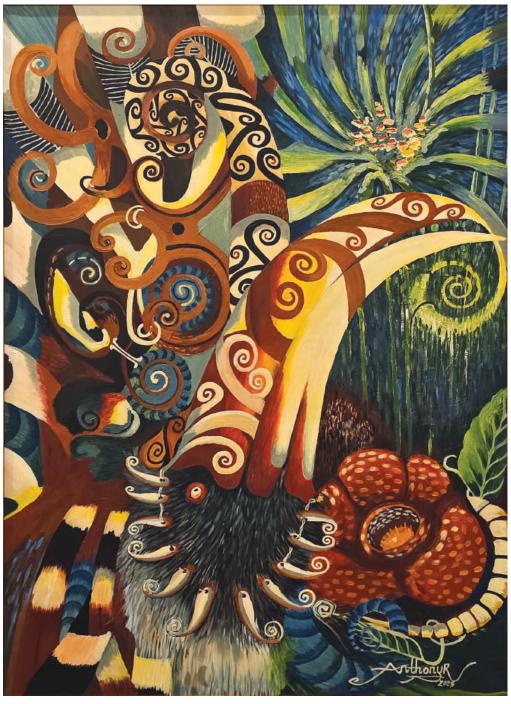
